2015 saw another year of many, many exam successes at Turton. Alongside preparing for exams, we help students to develop good character and the skills needed to equip them for their lives beyond Turton. Evidence of this is in the 85% of our year 13 students who went to university this term, 21% of whom are at Russell Group universities. Results days were again delightful days, with the vast majority of students gaining their first choice destinations.

So, how do we achieve good results year on year? In addition to the core subjects, we offer a broad range of subjects across all key stages. In Year 7 students study: Maths, English and Science; History, Geography, Faith and Ethics, French, Spanish, Computing, Art, Drama, Music, Technology, PE and Opening Minds. We begin to tailor the curriculum in Year 8, with the opportunity to decide which language to take and provide additional support for numeracy and literacy where needed. Opening Minds develops curiosity and critical thinking, with students encouraged to take risks and extend themselves beyond their comfort zones.

We welcome and encourage a strong student voice in school, encouraging them to offer suggestions and give feedback; as well as inviting students to help with staff appointments. Homework is an important part of learning and helps students to further develop independent learning skills. The broad key stage 3 curriculum offered at Turton provides a strong basis for success at key stages 4 and 5.

Indeed, in summer 2015, 60% of students gained A*-C including English and Maths, and 74% of students gained 5 grades at grades A*-C. Results in a range of subjects were something to celebrate, with many students achieving at the very highest level. Subjects such as History, Dance and further additional Science saw over 40 % of their pupils achieve at A*/A; whilst in Performing Arts, Faith and Ethics and Music a phenomenal 50% or more achieved A*/A. Our levels of progress were also something for our students to be proud of, with many subjects including English, Spanish, and History performing well above the national average for both expected and more than expected progress.

At A level 49% of grades were A*- B, with 13 subjects gaining the accolade of gaining a red hot value on the ALPS, a national value added measurement.

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At Turton we believe learning matters, that the individual matters and that the young people in our care not only matter but also deserve the very best. The best curriculum, the best character education and the best chance in life. Our curriculum is based around the principle of making learning relevant to life and at the same time achieving examination success, and we are rightly very proud of our results and our students.

We look forward to working with you as parents to achieve the successes 2021 will bring and seeing the young people we have cared for and nurtured together off into their futures.
