The money issue!

New Year is traditionally a time for thinking about change, especially new jobs or careers. Careers should provide us with challenge, a sense of purpose, a chance to develop socially and intellectually, but also the means to survive- paying for food, clothing, housing, entertainment and of course the luxuries like holidays etc.

This Turton Trail bulletin looks at which jobs are best for earning 'big money' and also those jobs which are considered by many to have large salaries but in fact aren't as good as people think.

We have to be clear that we are talking about the average salary of a person in a particular job and many people in the same job might have higher or lower salaries than those stated depending on their experience, the company they work for and the number of others they are responsible for.

The next page lists the top 145 UK jobs based on average salary (2017)can you find your dream career in the list? How does it compare to the salary for other careers that you have considered? What other factors should you take into account when choosing?

Quick look: Average salaries...

If you had to guess the best paid careers you might understandably guess: solicitors, doctors, dentists, pharmacists, vets and accountants. All of these have been highlighted in the list but you might be surprised as to other jobs which outperform these in terms of average salary.

Quick look: Brokers...

Brokers are people or groups of people who work as go-betweens or intermediaries between buyers and sellers. They earn their money by charging a fee (known as a commission) when the deal has been completed.

There are three main types of Brokers:

Full Service Brokers,

Discount Brokers,

Online Brokers.

They work in a range of industries to help sell a variety of different services and commodities, including mortgages, insurance, and stocks and shares.

Typical duties for a Broker may include:

- Buying and selling securities for clients
- Working closely with traders to encourage sales
- Monitoring and analysing the financial market
- Making recommendations for investments
- Improving and expanding the client base.

What qualifications do you need?

Most employers expect you to have a degree when you apply for a Stockbroker job, preferably a business related course such as Accounting, Finance, Economics, Business or Finance. If your degree is not related to commerce, as long as you are able to show your vast knowledge in how the financial markets work then you are still in with a chance. To get onto the degree course you will need 2-3 good A Level grades.

Alternatively, you could follow the Degree Apprenticeship route.

Suitable work experience is vital and you will have to be authorized with the FSA (Financial services Authority) by passing their exams.

Salary: £24,000 to £125,000

The basic pay is good but it is the extra 'perks' and bonuses that make the pay so substantial in the league table.

Skills required:

- excellent verbal communication skills
- maths knowledge
- analytical thinking skills
- knowledge of economics and accounting
- the ability to use your judgement and make decisions
- customer service skills
- the ability to accept criticism and work well under pressure

- the ability to use your initiative
- You will be expected to use a computer confidently as part of this job.

Quick look: surprise entry in the league table-train driver...

In this role you could be:

- checking equipment and engines
- contacting control centres for information about routes and any problems
- following signalling instructions during the journey
- making passenger announcements
- controlling automatic doors
- positioning and handing over engines to drivers on the next shift
- recording incidents like equipment problems, dangers and delays

You'll need to be over 20 years of age and live within 1 hour (travel time) of the area you're applying for. You'll have to pass a medical and enhanced security checks.

Most people start in a related role like passenger assistant and then apply for trainee driver posts although you can apply direct with no formal qualifications needed.

Salary ranges from £20,000-£60,000 but you could also work overtime to earn more (evenings, weekends and bank holidays).

Skills needed:

- concentration skills
- to be thorough and pay attention to detail
- patience and the ability to remain calm in stressful situations
- the ability to operate and control equipment
- knowledge of public safety and security
- observation and recording skills
- the ability to work well with others

- knowledge of transport methods, costs and benefits
- Being able to use a computer terminal or hand-held device may be beneficial for this job.

Headstart is a UK-wide programme, provided by EDT, which provides an opportunity for 16 to 17 year olds to spend up to a week at a UK university prior to making their UCAS application. Spotlight on: Veterinary:



Qualifications needed:

- GCSEs at grades 9 to 7 (A* to B) including English, maths and science (especially chemistry and biology)
- 3 good A Level passes (A*/A normally) including chemistry and biology
- 5 year degree approved by the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons (RCVS)
- enhanced background checks by

- Work experience
- A driving licence for some jobs

Skills needed:

- knowledge of medicine and dentistry
- knowledge of biology
- customer service skills
- excellent verbal communication skills
- to be thorough and pay attention to detail
- patience and the ability to remain calm in stressful situations
- the ability to work well with your hands
- the ability to use your judgement and make decisions
- You will be expected to use a computer confidently as part of this job

Good subjects to choose:

Must take chemistry and biology at A Level but third A Level is not specified although many take maths.

Job in a nutshell:

- diagnosing and treating sick and injured animals
- performing operations
- carrying out tests such as blood analysis, Xrays and scans
- providing care for an animal in veterinary hospitals
- carrying out regular health checks and giving vaccinations
- checking farm animals and advising how to stop diseases spreading
- supervising veterinary nurses and support staff
- keeping records of treatments
- communicating with pet owners and insurers
- neutering animals to stop them breeding
- putting severely injured or terminally ill animals to sleep

- following public health and hygiene laws
- you could be working in a laboratory, in a vet practice or even outdoors.

Salary:

Salary: £30,000-£50,000

Any negatives?

You might need to wear a uniform or protective clothing and the hours can be long and unsociable. There is always a risk that animals can harm you too.
