| pedal | One note – held or repeated | |

| chromatic scale | Moving by half step | |
| motif | Important melodic idea / theme | |
| Major or Minor | Happy or Sad tonality / chord | |
| Leitmotif | Theme for a specific character | |
| legato / staccato | Notes played smooth / short | |
| mickey mousing | Music copies motion on screen | |
| hit point | Where a sound is placed to match visual moment exactly | |
| accompaniment | the backing part | |
| chord | notes played together | |
| accented | notes played with force / hit | |
