

## **Business**

### Why study Business?

This is a modern, dynamic course which encourages the practical application of business concepts by exploring events in the business world and relating these to business theories and practice.

Using extremely relevant subject content, Business is one of only a few "live" subjects available - with fresh examples of both good (and poor!) practice emerging from the news almost daily. Business prepares you for the world of work and how to cope with all the intricate decisions that businesses are faced with.

### Where does it lead?

Our students go on to study a range of degrees and courses including Management Studies, Law, Marketing, Accounting and Finance. Past students are now employed in the finance sector, marketing, retail management and pharmaceutical industry.

### What does it go well with?

Business goes well with many different subjects across the sixth form. However, a lot of Business students tend to study: Economics, Geography, Mathematics and Social Sciences.

#### Requirements

Business: Grade 5 or English Language: Grade 5 and Maths: Grade 5.

"Business has allowed for a deeper understanding of how businesses operate both within themselves and with other businesses. The teaching style at Turton Sixth Form allows students to both enjoy their time studying while also developing a deeper knowledge of the business world. ## The Course

A-LEVEL

You will follow the AQA specification and study:

- · What is business?
- · Managers, leadership and decision making.
- Decision making to improve marketing, operational, financial and human resource performance.
- · Analysing the strategic vision of a business
- · Choosing strategic direction
- · Strategic methods: how to pursue strategies
- · Managing strategic change

### Paper 1:

Three compulsory sections:

Section A 15 multiple choice questions.

Section B has short answers up to a total of 35 marks.

Section C and D have two essay questions worth 25 marks each.

### Paper 2:

Three data response questions worth approximately 33 marks each, made up of three or four part questions.

#### Paper 3:

One compulsory case study followed by six essay style questions.

There will be three two hour exams. Each worth 100 marks and representing 33.3% of the A Level.
