Learning top tip #3

Flash cards are one of the simplest, but most effective, revision tools. They are small cards with a question, picture or prompt on one side, and the answer or information on the other. To use them well you need to make them yourself and then test yourself by speaking the answers out loud. You can also get friends and family to test you.

The Mythmakers by John Hendrix

This graphic novel biography tells the story of the friendship two literary greats, C. S Lewis and J. R. R Tolkien. Hendrix chronicles Lewis and Tolkien's near-idyllic childhoods, then moves on to both men's horrific tour of the trenches of World War I to their first meeting at Oxford in 1929, and then World War II.

This book is beautifully presented and gives a real insight into the mind of two of our most popular writers. If you loved *The Hobbit* or *The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe* I would definitely recommend this book.





Jump in

Life in Bearmouth is one of hard labour, the sunlit world above the mine a distant memory. Reward will come in the next life with the benevolence of the Mayker. Newt accepts everything - that is, until the mysterious Devlin arrives. Suddenly, Newt starts to look at Bearmouth with a fresh perspective, questioning the system, and setting in motion a chain of events that could destroy their entire world.

This dystopian novel explores a world where workers are treated as little more than pit ponies, both living and working in the dark depths of a mine. Written in first person, it is an extraordinary tale about someone who dares to challenge the status quo. This novel will change the way you think about reading, and about life itself.

Government and Politics

Why study Government and Politics?

This course allows you to understand the UK system of government and our political environment. Our students become confident in explaining key political ideas and concepts. Over the two years you will develop your analysis and evaluation skills to confidently answer the written exam questions. Our students are keen, well read and become fully committed to the subject. Results are excellent and above the national average for this course.

Where does it lead?

This is a well-respected academic course, valued at the top universities. Our students go on to study a range of degrees and courses including Law, Journalism and the Humanities.

Past students are now employed in education, marketing, the civil service and the media.

What does it go well with?

Government and Politics will fit well with any subject. However, many of our students also study History, English, Economics and Social Sciences.

Requirements

Government and Politics is an essay based subject. You therefore need to write well and have gained at least a 5 in English.

The Course

A-LEVEL

You will follow the edexcel course and study:

Unit 1: UK Politics and Political ideas

This will include political participation, electoral systems and voting behaviour.

Unit 2: UK Government and Political ideas.

This will include parliament, the UK Supreme Court and Parliament.

Unit 3: US Government and Politics

This unit looks at the US system of government and politics. You compare and contrast the UK and US system.

There will be three two hour exams with some short answer questions and essay based questions.
